Greetings friends,

Mark and I are taking off later this week for a quick trip to Niceville, Florida to pick up my sister, Kelly. As we are making our plans and beginning to gather things to be packed for both of us and, of course, Miss Trixie, I can't help but think of the Texas and Florida folks who also packed in these last few weeks. Where my toughest decision is whether or not I want to take a bathing suit, they had to rush around and figure out how to protect precious family memorabilia, what to do with their beloved pets and safely pack identification materials and essentials. They had to secure their homes as best they could, not knowing if anything would be there when they returned. Mark and I will notify the post office, ask a friend to water our outdoor areas and drop a key off at my other sister's, but that is pretty much it. We're pretty confident things will be much the same as we left them when we return.

It is sobering. We know no one is promised tomorrow and life can change in a finger snap, but most of us live with a fair certainty that all will be well when we wake up in the morning. When that "certainty" is ripped away, that is when we figure out that life isn't concerned about "fair" and when it comes to the fury of nature, we are pretty powerless. That is where the kindness and generosity of strangers as well as family and friends play life-changing roles. That is where we get a true estimate of our own fortitude and grit. And that is when Faith and Hope in the Almighty step in to carry us forward.

A friend pointed out Luke 21:25-28 to me last weekend. This passage describes the Coming of Jesus.

There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near.

None of us knows where we are in God's timeline for the Second Coming of Jesus. With the recent eclipse, these terrible storms, and the pervasive unrest around the world, it sure does seem to be aligning with this scriptural passage. We could be rapidly approaching the end of days...or not. There have been eclipses, droughts, fire, famine and terrible storms juxtaposed many times since Jesus ascended into Heaven. There has been horrible unrest throughout the world since the moment Adam and Eve left the Garden, we know that. But, we really don't know if recent events are the Biblical described signs.

Here's my takeaway: Regardless of signs, *Be prepared in your spiritual life because truly nothing of this world will matter in the End Times.* Examine your relationship with Jesus. Have you asked Him into your life and placed your trust in Him? Have you repented and asked Him for forgiveness for your sins and do you strive to be like Him in what you do and say and in how you treat others? Are you ready to lean on him and trust that all will be well in His timing? *Today, tomorrow, next week or a hundred years from now, your relationship with Jesus is paramount.* Everything else is just "stuff" and of little consequence in God's eternal plan.

FINANCIAL REPORT – June 30, 2017

At the end of the second quarter of 2017, Grace’s **General Endowment Fund** had a balance of \$43,393, with a year-to-date income of \$196.00. The **Hendrickson Fund (undesigned)** had grown to \$12,557, earning \$56.62 through June. The **Beckman Fund (Camping)** had a balance of \$3,827, with a year-to-date income of \$17.25. The **Frandsen Fund (Youth)** had grown to \$12,808, earning \$57.75 through June. The **Elevator Fund**, instituted in February 2014, had a balance at the end of June of \$9,709, with a year-to-date income of \$43.83.

Overall, Grace’s Endowment Funds have earned \$371.45 so far in 2017, growing to **\$82,294** from an initial principal investment of \$72,385. Grace’s funds are conservatively allocated with 52% invested in **Equity Funds** – which have grown 19.59% over the last twelve months – and 48% in **Fixed Income Bond Funds** – which have grown 2.07% over the last twelve months.

The **average annual net returns** for the funds invested in by Grace (and managed by the Iowa United Methodist Foundation), as of June 30, 2017 follow:
