

From Our Pastor

Beloveds.

It seems odd to be sitting here mid-February, barely into the season of Lent, writing about what we have to look forward to in March. Easter is more than a month away—March 31, the last day of the month. Daylight Saving Time begins March 10 (is that still a thing?). The schools will be on spring break that week. The spring equinox is March 19. And then there is Holy Week. And I have many more things of a vocational nature and items of personal business on my calendar. I bet you do, too.

So it seems odd to be thinking about all of these things when we are still in Lent, in the winter season, and, while this may go down as the warmest lowa winter on record, we are waiting for the other shoe to drop.

Daily the Earth turns into the Sun. The change of seasons is a reminder of God's faithfulness and providence. Life and faith lead us forward, sometimes against our inclinations to hold back, resist, find comfort in the status quo, dragging our feet as we are propelled toward something better.

I read a book written by one of our most experienced astronauts. He had been part of several space shuttle and ISS crews. He reminded his readers that so-called "zero gravity" isn't really that at all. Everywhere in space, especially in Earth orbit, things are attracted to the nearest large mass. In the case of the space shuttle, this meant that the spacecraft was falling to earth faster than its human occupants, so it seemed like one was floating in the air. The astronaut said that sometimes, when one was standing on the flight deck, one would suddenly lurch forward, as if they were tripping. It was a reminder that, whether an astronaut knew it or not, he or she was moving forward.

Will spring ever get here? Does Easter seem so far away? Even now, I know that God is calling us forward and he has plans for us when we get there.



Grace UMC Council Unofficial Minutes from February 26, 2024 Meeting

Present: Gloria Sampson (Chair), Becky Barclay (Finance), Jim Hassebrock (Trustees), Louis Reeder (Trustees), Pastor Jonathan, Cheryl Semler (Worship), Krystle Ness (SPRC), Patsy Jensen (UWF), Gini Michel (Christian Education), Jan Feil (Missions)

Jonathan offered prayer and Gloria opened the meeting.

Gini/Patsy Moved the January minutes be accepted as written. Motion carried.

Finance: Becky reported we have paid our first two months of apportionments. February was a good month for giving, including the Mission brunch; February funds go toward the remediation from the pipes bursting in the chapel.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Jonathan reported dates that he will be out: March 7th conference, March 13th retirement meeting and March 20th retirement event. Shannon will be out of the office the morning of March 13th. Lent services will be taking place on March 6, 13, & 20. Grace will host the Roland-Story Ministerial group on March 21st. Church statistics were due to the conference on Thursday, February 28th, all-in-all, the statistics are about the same as were submitted in 2022 with 260 members.

Committee Reports: Ministry Area

Worship: Cheryl reported satisfaction with the Scout Sunday service this month. There will be no communion during worship during the months of April and May.

Christian Education: Gini reported the adjusted classrooms are working well and is thankful for the continued flexibility.

Missions: Jan reported in 2023, Loaves and Fishes had 140 volunteers, 563 hours, and overall missions giving was \$16,690. A grant application was submitted with In Gathering to go towards the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry. In February Loaves and Fishes had 12 volunteers serving 19 families and 69 individuals and 140# of food was donated. Mission brunch raised \$628.87 for the Roland Story Food Pantry.

UWF: Patsy reported the group is discussing meeting at Timberland, inviting two from Cedar Place and connecting with residents at Bethany Life.

Committee Reports: Administrative Area

SPRC: Krystle reported their first meeting for the year on February 12th was spent meeting with District Superintendent Ron Carlson and pastoral candidate Rev. Jena Finch-Manchester. Rev. Finch-Manchester will be the next pastor at Grace church. The committee will prepare our conference review form (formerly 'Another Set of Eyes') between now and our next meeting in April.

Trustees: Louis & Jim reported remediation work is in progress for the chapel and youth rooms. The floor in the chapel is being prepped for the installation of new Luxury Vinyl Plank (LVP) flooring. The week of March 4th, the asbestos remediation will be happening in the basement youth rooms. The final proposal for the Grace Trustees Capital Campaign was presented to the council. Upon review the proposal a motion was made by Patsy/Krystle. Motion carried. A copy of the proposal will be included in the church newsletter.

Endowment: Jonathan reported Michelle Hassebrock will serve as the committee chair.

New Business: Jonathan shared a letter from Alyssa Loots asking if Grace Church would be the host site for the Angel Tree Program in 2024. Gini moved to approve the use of Grace Church for the 2024 Angel Tree Program. Patsy seconded the motion and motion carried.

Gloria adjourned meeting at 7:34 pm

Trustees Capital Campaign

Proposal for Grace Trustees Capital Campaign

Over the past few years, several significant projects have arisen that require funding above and beyond the trustee's annual budget. The Trustees have worked to identify and prioritize four key projects that are considered necessary for the upkeep and continued functionality of the church property.

An *ad hoc* Fundraising committee was formed to examine the needs and feasibility of a campaign to raise the necessary funds to complete the projects identified by the trustees. Members of that committee are Jim Hassebrock, Becky Barclay, Dave Barclay, Chris Feil, Dan Webster, Lorijo Lounsberry, and Louis Reeder.

The Capital Campaign was informally announced to the congregation in December to provide church members an opportunity to make contributions in calendar year 2023 and \$3,700.00 were contributed.

We are asking the Council to approve the Trustees plan to begin a 3-year capital campaign to raise \$225,000.00 to complete the following projects.

- 1. **Sanctuary Roof Replacement**. This is our highest priority and includes replacement of the roof installation of gutter guards, and roof access to the sanctuary air handlers. Estimate from TMJ Construction \$43,306.34
- 2. **HVAC Replacement**. This is our second priority and includes replacement of HVAC system in the church offices, classrooms, kitchen, sanctuary, and parsonage. The office system will need to be replaced in the spring of 2024 because the compressor for that area was removed in the fall of 2023 to provide access for the grading project along the east side of the building. The other systems can be replaced as needed. They are currently working, but are approximately 30 years old. If any system fails, the need for replacement becomes immediate. Estimate from O'Conner Heating and Cooling \$45,750.00
- 3. **Automated Door Openers**. The third priority item is an automated door opening system for one outer door and one inner door at the west entrance to the church. This will improve accessibility to the church. Estimate from Basepoint Building Automation \$7,400.00
- 4. **Parking Lot Repaving**. Six-inch asphalt in the parking area and alley plus 12 parking bumpers. Install a storm water intake at the SE corner of the alley and connect to city storm sewer in the east/west alley south of the parsonage. Estimate from Manatts \$82,190.00
